Overall Character Summary Statement

A gently undulating landscape of mostly coniferous plantations with Corsican pine and some Scots pine. Birch woodland fringes some of the edges of these woodlands with oak along hedge lines. Small blocks of deciduous trees (oak and sycamore) with gorse and bracken are found along grass verges alongside minor roads. Arable fields run west of the A614 with some residential houses south east of Sansom Wood Farm. Recreation is a feature of this lcp with woodland for pheasants, horse riding and picnic sites within the woodland. The Robin Hood Way runs north-south through this area. Views are generally contained by blocks of woodland and rolling landform although Blidworth is visible looking from the higher ground along Blidworth Lane.

The main threat to the area is the intensification of the processing/packaging side which may bring more or larger buildings and the intensification of farming generally resulting in loss of hedgerows and the small farms that remain.

Description The major landuse is the restored mineral workings of Clipstone colliery, part of which has been reclaimed to form Vicar Water Country Park. Rufford Colliery is still in process of restoration but slopes of both spoil tips have been planted with mixed forestry plantations. There are significant areas of plantation mixed woodland to the restored spoil tips and spoil tips under restoration, and many other smaller areas of woodland. There is an area of parkland woodland around Ransom Wood. Much of the area was formerly shown as open heathland on the Sanderson plan. The main threat to the area is residential growth and industrial development and possible new road connections to the MARR route.

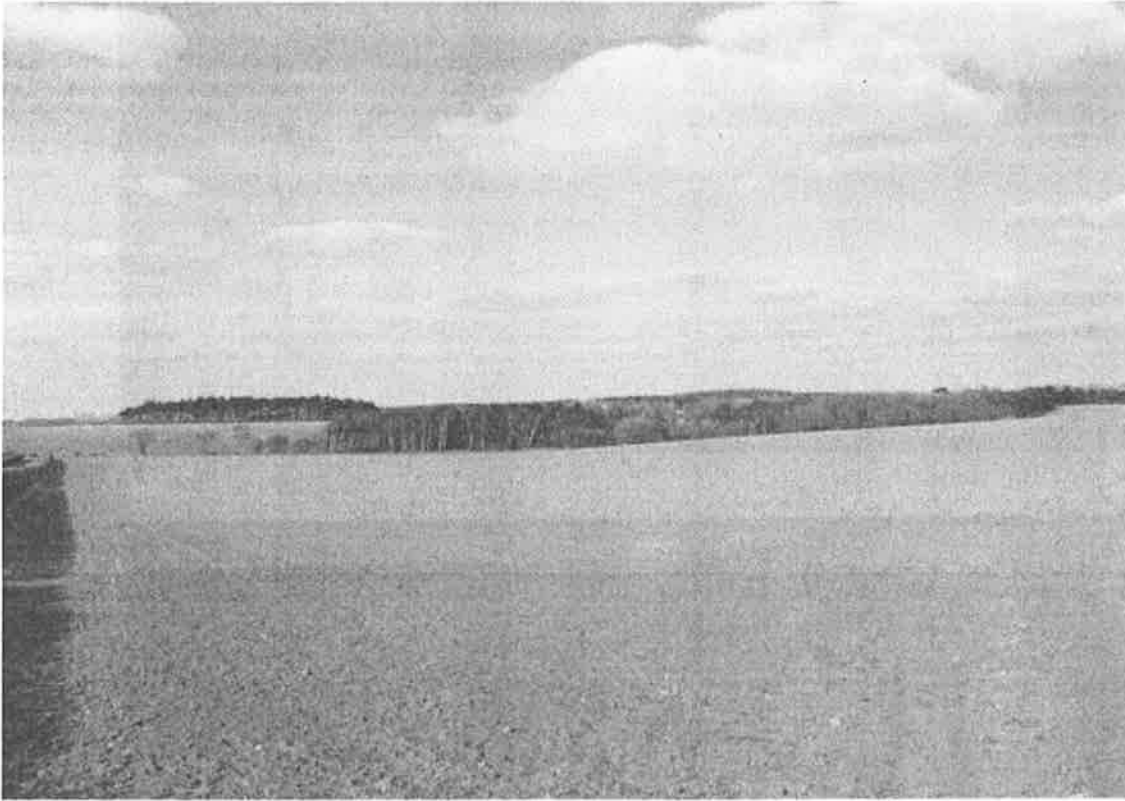
Historic Pattern - Description The Sanderson Plan field pattern has been changed by much hedgerow removal particularly to the western area of LCP which was formerly many small fields, the central area of parkland landscape has become less apparent although remnants including the avenue and isolated trees remain. Much of Scrofton Wood which was once connected to Rayton Angle has been lost. Some Sanderson woodland boundaries remain such as East Thievesdale Wood but the shelter belt planting is a more recent addition.

Historic Pattern - Vulnerability to change Threats include further loss of historic pattern due to hedgerow removal, further removal of Sanderson woodland boundary pattern as well as the woodlands themselves, changes in the degree of coniferous planting within LCP, decline in condition of mature trees including parkland and avenue trees.

Overall Character Summary Statement

The landform across the LCP is gently undulating and slopes down to the River Ryton valley to the south and east. There are open views to distant wooded skylines and to the south the landform falls away and is well wooded around Osberton Hall, there is some interruption of the medium distance views by thin shelter belts of Scots Pine. The landform falls away to the south to the wooded valley around Osberton Hall outside the LCP. Landuse consists of arable farming with some grazing of sheep and cattle on improved pasture. There is only isolated residential settlement associated with farm properties. There was formerly an airfield to the centre of this area but this has now been grassed over. Woodland consists of small deciduous woodlands with a high proportion of Oak and small clumps of coniferous woodland. The thin Pine belts are a distinct visual feature of the LCP. Road hedge boundaries are well maintained hawthorn, internal field boundaries are mainly post and wire fences. There is a remnant avenue and isolated parkland trees. The main threats to the LCP are further removal of hedgerows, this has already been extensive. There may be changes in degree of afforestation or removal of existing deciduous woodland due to farm intensification. Mature trees, the remnant avenue and road side hedgerows may decline due to poor maintenance and management.

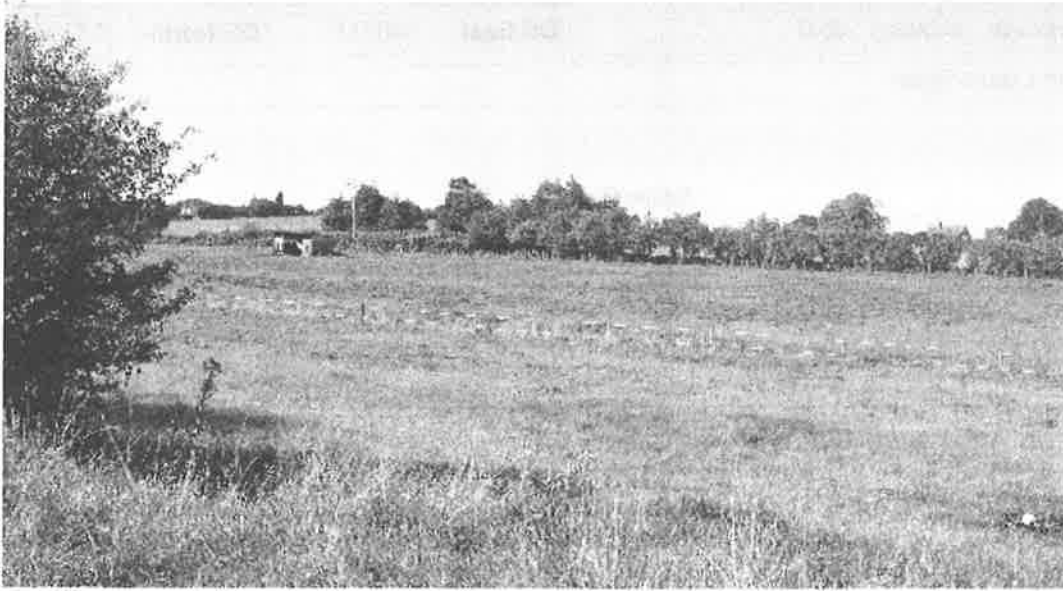

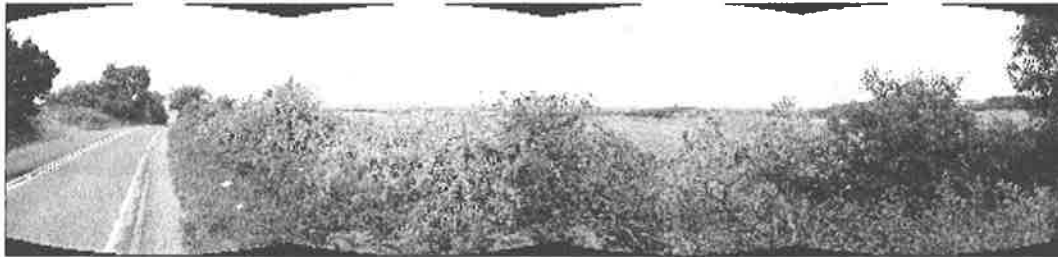

Landuses varied within but include agricultural uses, mainly set aside with a small area of pasture to the north east, fringe of horticulture to edge of Mansfield and Sutton in Ashfield, also industrial development of Oakham Business Park, also reservoir and associated recreational activity, isolated farms are the only residential use. Only woodland is a strong fringe to Oakham Business Park and a fringe to the reservoir. Some strong, mature road hedge boundaries with trees particularly along Cauldwell Road, internal hedgerow boundaries present but gappy and poorly maintained. Major transport route of MARR now passes through centre of LCP, historic pattern is breaking down due to pressure for development but remnants of the older landscape exists in small areas. The main threat to the area is development pressure along the MARR route and from spread of edges of Mansfield southwards and the Maun valley industrial estate northeastwards.

Hedgerow trees are limited to those field boundaries along the roadsides. The greatest threat to the character of the area would be a change in the management practices of the golf course (which are currently quite sympathetic to biodiversity objectives).

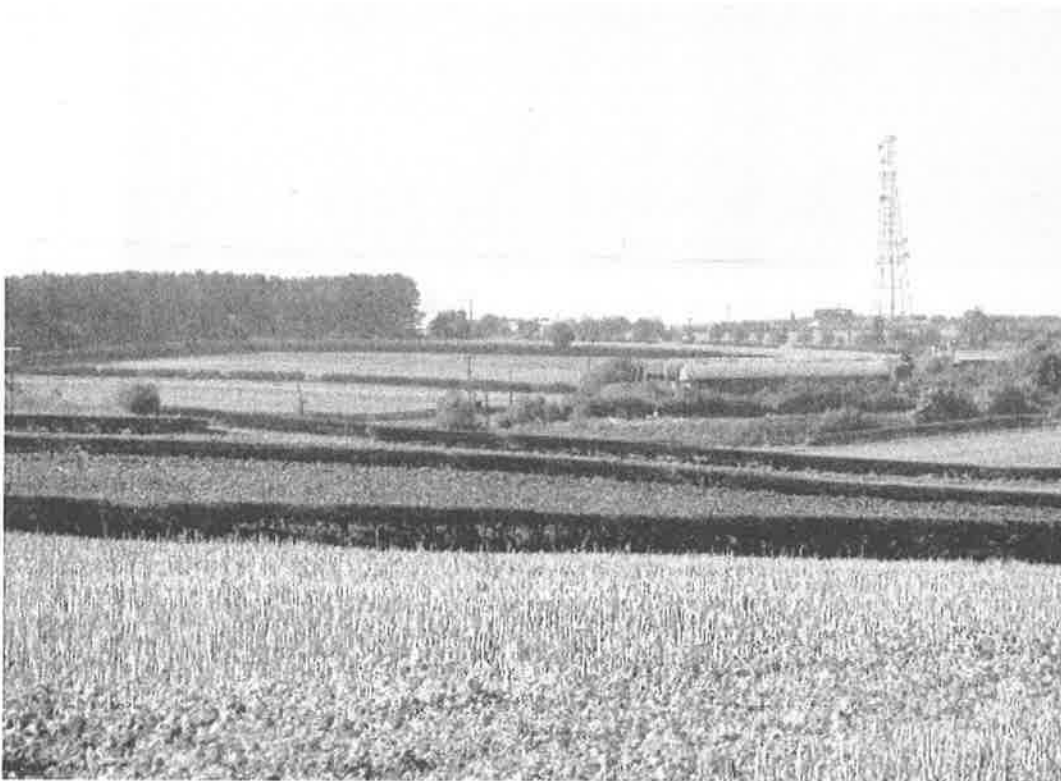

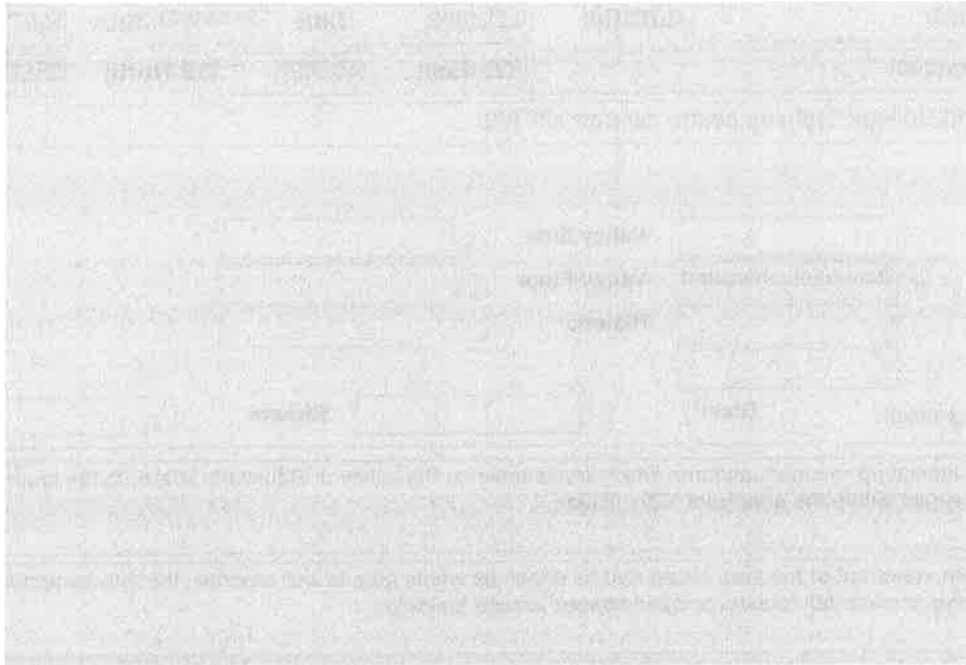

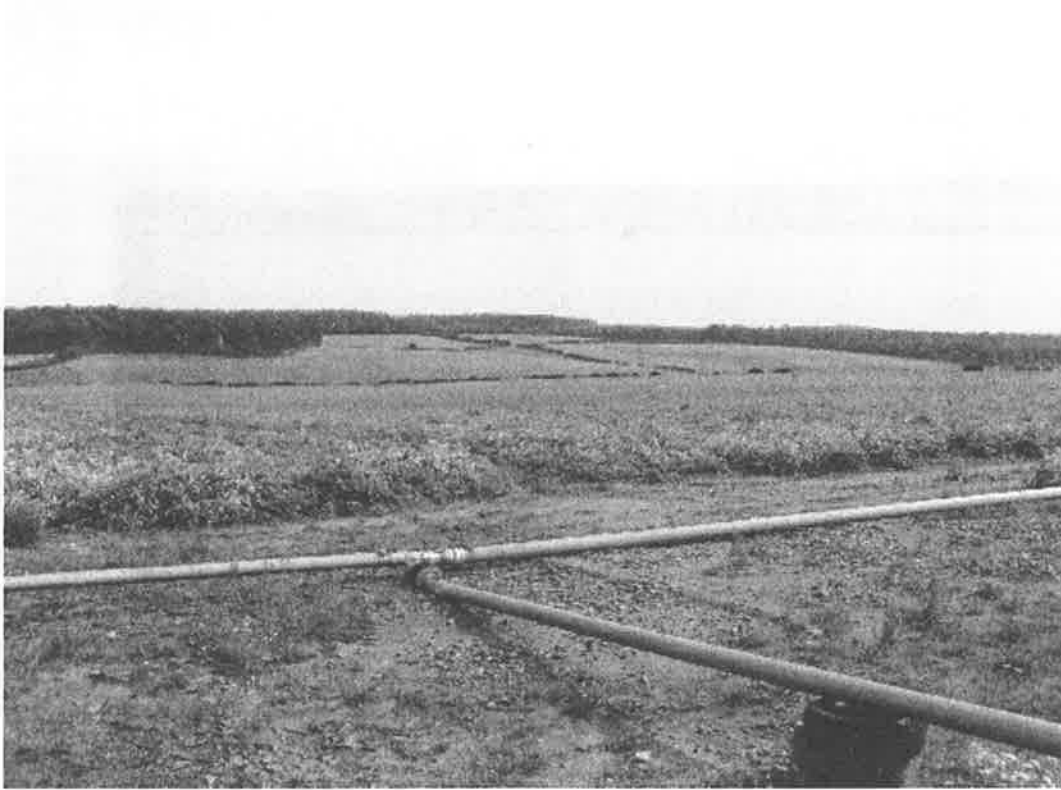

Small isolated blocks of woodland to the south east and west of the LCP on higher ground. Shelter belts to the north east of Beech Farm. Residential properties located along the A638 between Barnaby Moor and Torworth are non vernacular and mostly post 2nd WW.. Large scale agricultural buildings at Grange Farm to south eastern corner of LCP. Electricity pylons run north-west to south-east. Short sections of public rights of way join up roads and lanes. A1 cuts through north west corner of LCP.
